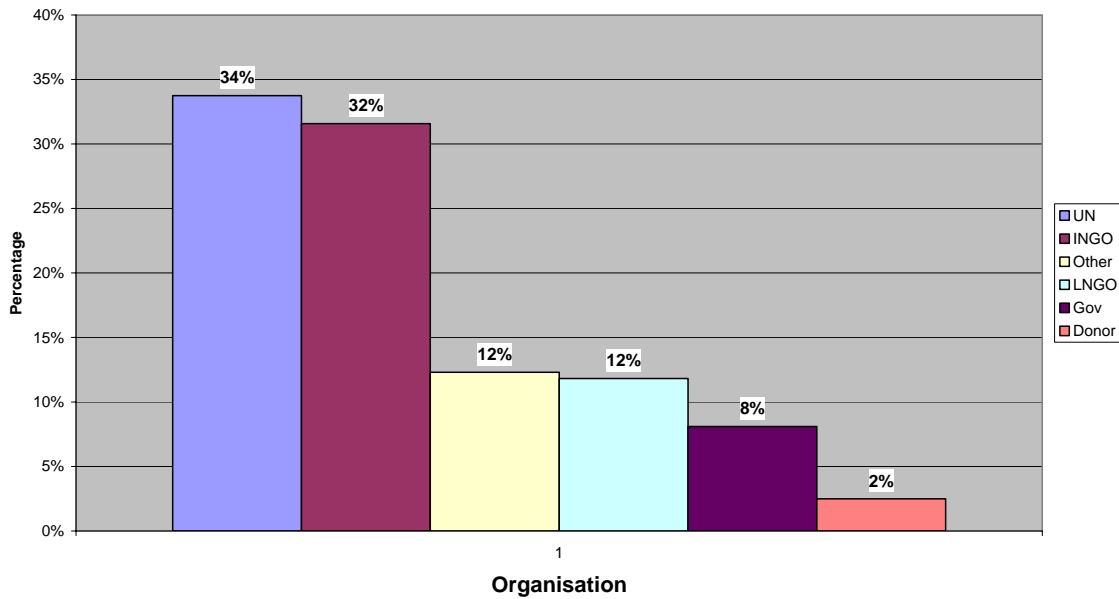


**MONUC CAS Monthly Logistical Report**  
**June 2006**

**A. Non-MONUC Personnel**

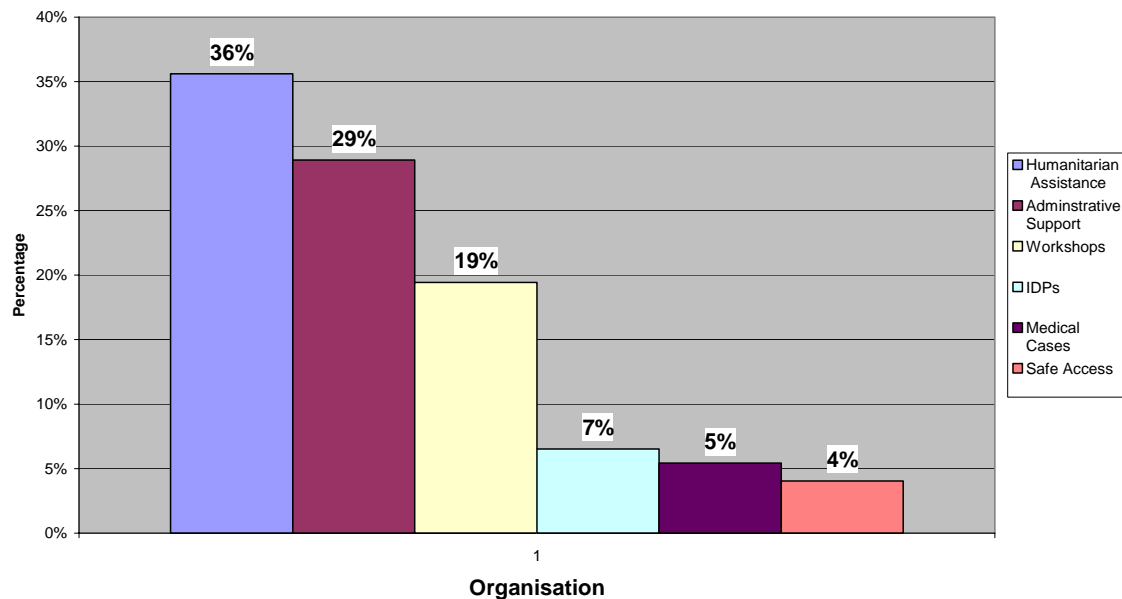
In the month of June 06, the Civil Affairs Section (CAS) facilitated the transportation of **643 Non-MONUC personnel** involved in various operational humanitarian and development activities within the DRC. This figure includes 217 UN Agencies 203 International NGOs, 70 Local NGOs 52 Government Institutions, 16 Donor Agencies and 79 from various organizations.

**Movement by Organisation**



Majority of these humanitarian actors transported during the month are involved in operational activities related to humanitarian assistance with particular attention to internally displaced persons (IDPs) and other vulnerable groups, as well personnel providing administrative and technical support to their field offices.

### B. Non-MONUC Cargo

During the same month, CAS facilitated the transportation of a total of **32.3 MT** of Non-Monuc cargo of which 70 % of represents general humanitarian assistance, 20% administrative support and 10% assistance to IDPs.

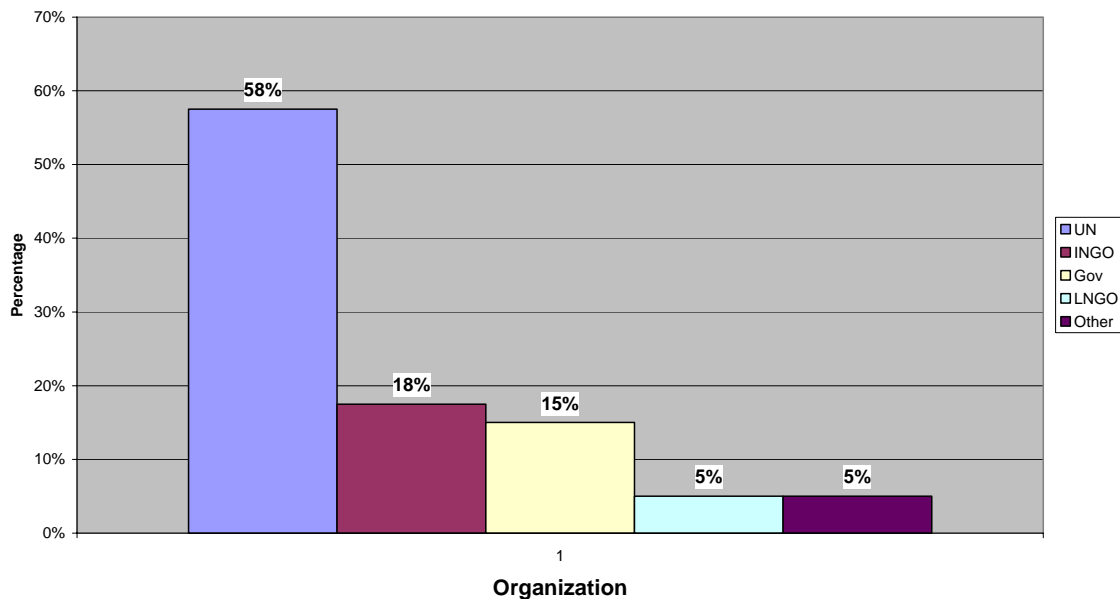
Using MONUC Special Flights, WFP received MONUC assistance to transport 23.4 MT of food and medicines from Bunia to Bukiringi (20 minutes flight from Bunia) situated in the southern Irumu Territory. The food was distributed to IDPs in the region and their hosts.

About 4 MT included UNICEF emergency relief cargo comprising of medicines, therapeutic milk, and rehydration salt for the internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Mitwaba in Katanga province, as well as beans to feed prisoners in Kisangani.

Other non-food items consisted of offices supplies and communication equipment in support of various humanitarian NGOs and UN agencies who are expanding their areas of intervention across the country, as well as transportation equipment (bicycles, vehicles, motorcycles) to facilitate coverage of the immunization campaigns against measles and to ease transportation problems encountered during the implementation of various health activities in Kongolo and Manono in Katanga province.

### C. Special Flight Request

#### Kalemie

CAS- Kalemie initiated a special flight on 16 June 2006. This was to facilitate a medical evacuation from Nyunzu to Kalemie of a 15 year old boy who in the process of falling from tree been seriously wounded in the chest after being impaled by a branch

#### Bunia

CAS-Bunia facilitated 5 Special Flights in June 06.

On the 8 June, CAS organized and led a humanitarian joint mission to assess number of displaced persons and to evaluate priority needs of the IDPs in Bukiringi, in Irumu territory. CESVI and MEDAIR (INGOs) , UNHCR. WFP and UNICEF were also represented in this mission.

As a follow up mission, on 10 June CAS facilitated and conducted a second joint mission to Bukiringi to transport 23.4 MT of WFP food and medicines. This emergency humanitarian cargo, transported using three special flights, was distributed to 4,750 IDPs that had been identified in the area. WFP, OCHA and Radio Okapi also participated in mission.

Following reports from MONUC's Ituri Brigade that 900 persons had returned to their homes of origin in Tchei, Irumu territory, CAS led a joint assessment with UNICEF, UNHCR, OCHA and WFP on 21 June to closely assess the situation and evaluate IDP needs in that region.
